SEARCH FOR BOY CONTINUES

'Where Would You Have Looked?' Is Meaningful N.D. Question

WILLISTON (N.D.)—Where would you have looked?

That question I have asked myself and others repeatedly and always the answer is the same. "I don't know."

The three words are fraught with meaning when applied to the disappearance three weeks ago of a four-year-old boy—Lavern Enget.

As most people throughout the state are aware, Lavern, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Overt Enget, disappeared from the remote farm of his parents northeast of Powers Lake, in Burke County, North Dakota. He has been the object of the most intense and widespread search ever conducted in North Dakota after he failed to return when he left to get the cows with his father.

During that week, up to 2,000 persons a day combed the rugged slough-shaded country surrounding the Enget farm to find the missing boy.

SEARCHERS LEAVE

For the last week and a half things have been quiet. No longer are long lines of searchers seen moving slowly and inevitably across the Dakota skyline—moving forward, checking each bush, each hole, riding horseback through sloughs—checking to find at least the body of the little lost boy.

No more does the drone of airplanes break the silence of the Dakota farmland as when two weeks ago planes swept the skies in a radius of 20 miles in what seemed a hopeless search. No longer does the helicopter hover above the sloughs like a giant dragonfly, for things are quiet now.

For the last week and a half the official search has been abandoned. Crows from this entire region—people from Canada and northeast Montana—they are gone. Most have given up hope that Lavern is alive. "I don't see how he could be," they say.

Still, the search goes on as other mothers and other fathers, secure in the thought that their own children are safe at home, go daily to the brush-covered hills and search in the places where they think a little boy must be.

A FEW RETURN

Not many of these persons have kept up the three-week vigil, but every day a few return to bolster the hope of Lavern's parents who refuse to give up that hope. "We don't think he's out there," they say. "He can't be. We know he's alive, but we don't think he's out there."

"Where can he be? We don't know."

But the boy's mother, red-eyed still, but calmer, "knows" her son is alive and as the days wear on and no word arrives, her belief is stronger that someone, somewhere, has picked him up and taken him away.

Of all the measures taken in the search, Mrs. Enget had more faith in the dogs than anything else. And as each dog lost the scent or became tired and footsore, she placed her faith in another.

body disposed of. We just don't know," Ryan said.

MUCH ADVICE

Armchair advice has come to Burke County officials from all over the nation. Daily letters are delivered and phone calls relayed giving officials the lowdown on where to look. Many are illustrated with maps—maps drawn by people who never saw the area or the North Dakota terrain. They point out spots to check—areas that have been gone over not once, but a dozen times.

For three weeks authorities have been running down rumors of all kinds, and daily the rumors mount. Officials have checked houses as far away as Kenmare where the boy has reportedly been seen. Others call saying that he has been found in Texas or that a woman, suffering from amnesia, was found in Jamestown, N.D., with the little boy.

Others say he is alive and in Canada. Some go even so far as to say he was found in a Gypsy camp in northern Canada.

Who knows where the rumors come from? But they come, are checked, and slowly fade to be replaced by others.

CANADIAN RUMORS

Only the Canadian rumor seems to have the least basis in fact. Ryan reported that on the night of Lavern's disappearance, a car came from the United States and "jumped" the border at Noonan into Canada. The customs at Noonan, which is located at the border, notified Estevan, Man., by telephone, but the car never reached there.

Lavern's father has relatives in that area. They were checked, and cleared of any connection. But the car never has turned up.

Lavern's disappearance may never be solved. But the question remains, "Where would you have looked?" or "Where would you look now?" and always the answer, "I don't know."

Director Jailed In Zoo's Deaths

VIENNA, Austria, (AP) Police said Saturday the director of Vienna's big Schoenbrunn Zoo has been arrested on suspicion of causing the death of animals by neglect.

Police charged that Dr. Julius Brachetka, held for questioning, sold the animals' carcasses after they died.

Police said Brachetka spent each year about \$12,000 on new animals for the zoo, but animals worth about the same amount died in the same period.
